A LITTLE TALK ABOUT RAIN

Seeing as how we have had a bit of rain I thought I would make that my topic for this month.

There are many sayings about rain, perhaps you've heard a few. For example "Into every life a little rain must fall", "He is right as rain", "April showers bring May flowers". But they have also brought flooding and devastation.

I have been awakened by my dog Dax each time we have a storm. He can smell a storm hours before it arrives. The first time he woke me up, he was panting like crazy. He comforted himself by walking back and forth under my half-asleep hand which I dangled off the side of the bed, and finally he started to jump on the side of the bed. Half asleep I let him out, got him food, checked for burrs in his feet none of which helped. Then I remembered that he gets real upset when there is a thunderstorm. Sure enough about an hour later I heard the thunder. If there is a storm coming, Dax does all he can to be close to me.

There are several stories about storms in scripture. Matthew 7:21-29 tells the one about the man who built a house on the sand, and a man who built the house on the rock. The moral of the story is "Everyone then who hears these words of mine and acts on them will be like a wise man who built his house on rock.

Discerning God's will requires sincerity of belief in Jesus, in God's word and action. It seems as though Jesus' word to us today is to build our lives on the rock on belief in him and doing the will of God. I wonder all the time what is the will of God. I see people in difficult situations, some even at wit's end wondering the same thing. They and I want to be in that place, our life aligned with the kingdom of God less stressed, lonely, more joyful and fulfilled doing the will of God, being useful, making a difference.

But you wonder then about tornadoes, earthquakes, and flash floods. When I was in sixth grade, a tornado struck the street on which I lived and took the roof off of my friend's house, but ours was intact. It couldn't be because my friend's house was built on sand, or because we were more faithful.

There is another issue to this whole building on rock or on sand thing, at least for me. I can't help but notice that I try to build a lot of things in my life; a faith; a family vacation; as a pastor a place to serve; not one of them is a house that will truly protect me from a storm. I am as subject to accident, (continued on next page)

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sickness, tragedy as the next person. Does that mean I am building on the sand and not the rock? The good news, at least for me, is not that I have a choice about building on rock or on sand. The good news is that Jesus is the rock despite my choice.

You can do the right thing, according to this text: you can search out the bedrock foundation, build yourself a sturdy house, and rest secure. Or you can do the wrong thing: fall in love with a little beachside cabin on stilts with an airy front porch that overlooks the sea, and talk yourself into buying it anyway (even though the inspector's report points out that the cabin is five feet above sea level on a disappearing spit of land). Either way, your house is just a house. It is not the rock itself. When the house is swept away—and some go sooner than others, to be sure—what remains is the rock. Cling to that. Let the rock be your foundation, and your scaffold.

In these rainy, stormy days it is always possible to cling to the rock, to hear the word of God and like the wise man build on the rock once again.

CHANGING THE COLORS

All during Lent we decorated the sanctuary with purple, the color which can symbolize pain, suffering and therefore mourning and penitence.

Now we are in Eastertide and the color is white, symbolizing light, renewal and hope, celebrating the resurrection of Jesus over 50 days. This will last until Pentecost, June 4.

That day you will see red in the sanctuary. Red is the color of fire and symbolizes the presence of God, in this instance, a commemoration and celebration of the receiving of the Holy Spirit by the early church. John the Baptist prophesied of the first Pentecost where Jesus would baptize with the Holy Spirit and with fire. Pentecost signifies the beginning of the church and the start of our season of growth and renewal, which will be shown by green in the sanctuary.

But not before June 11, Trinity Sunday, when we will return to white. Then it's green again through summer and most of fall.

You have heard about the Presbyterian camp at Clearwater Forest in northern Wisconsin because that's where our confirmation class is going to get the camp ready for the summer.

We have been hearing about the crisis in Syria for years but it really strikes home when we hear about some of our own.

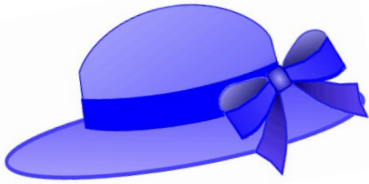
